

## Erratum

Rupert Gethin, the Editor of *Buddhist Studies Review* 22(2), apologises for an error in the printing of Richard Gombrich's 'Fifty Years of Buddhist Studies in Britain': inadvertently an unrevised version of the article was published, rather than the revised version supplied by the author. The Editor wishes to draw readers' attention to a correction on page 145, where the last two lines of paragraph 3 should read:
